




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2021 Coachella Valley Report

Information on the form included contact information of local pharmacy and clinics across the Coachella Valley. I also informed patients on how to sync their phones to their glucose meter as a means to allow their provider to measure glucose status remotely, eliminating the need to enter a clinical setting. 
